What is the Africa Hub?

MUA frican Interdisciplinary Studies Hub (Africa Hub) promotes interdisciplinary, collaborative research and teaching that contributes to a better understanding of Africa at the University of Missouri.

The vision of the Africa Hub is to foster and strengthen research, teaching, innovation, economic development and outreach programs in and about Africa at the University of Missouri.

The mission of the Africa Hub is to enrich the University of Missouri and surrounding communities. Through collaborative efforts, the Africa Hub will provide access to knowledge about Africa's rich legacies and encourage crosscultural perspectives.

The Africa Hub cultivates a space where scholars and students can deconstruct stereotypes about the African continent, explore vast terrain, examine diverse cultures and traditions, illuminate critical issues, and shape new frontiers of knowledge that encourage and promote understanding and the study of Africa.

Who is part of the initiative?

The Africa Hub is housed in the Division of Applied Social Sciences in the College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources, led by Dr. Jill Findeis. The Africa Hub is directed by Nadège Uwase, along with an Advisory Board comprised of 14 members - students, faculty, and staff. The Advisory Board is headed by Chair Dr. Patrick Pithua.

The Hub is aided in its mission by more than 100 Africanists at Mizzou. Africanists are students, staff, and faculty teaching courses, conducting research, taking students to study abroad programs, student organizations, and much more. Africanists are individuals promoting any initiatives/programs/events about Africa at Mizzou.

FY2017 Programs

Global Health Initiative: International Research Elective MU-Zambia Program

In FY17 Africanist Dr. Akwi Asombang of the School of Medicine will lead the MU-Zambia Program, providing two outstanding students from medical schools in Zambia -Lusaka Apex Medical University (LAMU) and Copperbelt University School of Medicine (CBU-SOM) – the opportunity to research under an MU School of Medicine faculty mentor over the course of one summer. Students will learn the latest research techniques and be exposed to new research experiences, enhancing their skills to better advance worldwide health initiatives. This partnership is an excellent opportunity to improve medical education, research, patient-care and institutional diversity. The MU-Zambia Program is a collaborative partnership with the Office of the Research Dean at the School of Medicine, and the start of a long-term partnership with CBU-SOM, LAMU and MU.

African Film Series

For FY17, the Africa Hub is curating a film series to promote the study and understanding of Africa. Cinema is a powerful platform, affording us space to debate political and cultural issues within our community.

These films are carefully selected to help MU campus become more inclusive by exploring universal themes such as work ethic, home, and identity. Wherever possible, filmmakers will meet with students and faculty, visit classrooms, and conduct post-screening Q&As with the audience.

The Africa Hub will continue to partner with the Life Sciences & Society Program (LSSP) and the Division of Applied Social Sciences to host monthly "blitz" lunch presentations of research by African professors, as well as those working on the continent, around the "Focus on Africa" theme. Presenters across the University highlight multi- disciplinary approaches to the intersections between the life sciences and human cultures. Thanks to the sponsorship of the Office of Research, the Africa Hub will expand the Focus on Africa audience in FY17 through partnership with MU TV to livestream the monthly 6 presentations.

FY16 Programs

Focus on Africa : September - December 2015 & January - April 2016

In collaboration with Dr. Mary Shenk and the Life Science & Society Program (LSSP), the Focus on Africa International Working Group offers monthly "blitz" lunch presentations to highlight the intersection among multiple disciplinary perspectives and to promote the

research of Africanists at Mizzou. Each month, 20-25 MU Africanist scholars meet over pizza and rapid-fire research presentations to stimulate each other's thinking and potentially lead to the creation of broader research networks and joint scholarship.

Black History Month Celebration : February 12, 2016

Award-winning South African writer and scholar Jonny Steinberg visited Mizzou. While at Mizzou, Steinberg gave two presentations and spent time with African Student Association. Currently teaching at Oxford University, he is also the author of several books about everyday life in the wake of South Africa's transition to democracy. The event was made possible with the financial support of Provost Office's Lectures Committee, School of Journalism, MU Libraries, and the Black History Month Committee.

Real Colorism : February 16, 2016

Dr. Stephanie Shonekan, Chair of MU's Black Studies Department, and Phelan Simpkins, president of Alpha Phi Alpha, served as Masters of Ceremony and led a conversation centered on the black diaspora, the historical context of colorism, self-awareness, language and the implications of how colorism impacts career and life choices. The event was presented in collaboration with the Missouri Student Association, Gaines/Oldham Black Culture Center, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity and the Black Studies Department.

Additional Collaborations
